

# **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MESSAGE**

# Dear Members,

I am pleased to say it has been another great year for Centre[3]! We continue to impact our community artistically, socially, and economically, and we continue to support artists in south-western Ontario in the creation, production, and presentation of their work. We have also maintained our commitment to engaging our wider community through our galleries and educational and community arts programming. Using art as a vehicle for project-based learning and community engagement, we help to enrich the lives of our citizens daily. The cultural diversity of our artists represents how our past shapes the future in defining who we are as Canadians.

Centre[3] is dedicated to promoting and ensuring a safe working environment for all staff, members, collaborators, and clients. This past year the board and staff revisited the health and safety policies, ensuring the inclusion of a policy and procedure on Safe Space (Braver Space) that mandates a safe and inclusive work environment. We are also committed to inclusivity and diversity through our activities and the community we serve and our organizational make-up with our board, staff, facilities, and programming. Centre[3] spent the last year working with staff and board members on the vision and mission of Centre[3], and we are currently revisiting our mandate, highlighting diversity and inclusivity. Centre[3] strives to avoid tokenism and focuses more on forming relationships with other groups, such as COBRA, Hamilton Centre for Civic Inclusion, Hamilton Regional Indian Centre, and the YWCA.

Over the past 15 years, our earned and raised revenue has increased. Public grants comprise most of the revenue. In the future, we aim to focus on the private sector and building relationships with corporations, including patron membership and sponsorship. We are launching a Corporate Membership Drive to secure artist benefits, increase membership and project revenue.

I would like to thank the Board of Directors for their dedication and advice in achieving our goals; the staff for their expertise in helping to make Centre[3] a much needed centre in our community; and our members who are the core of what we do as an artist-run centre. We look forward to working with the board, staff, and members in 2020, both as an artists' hub and as a space for the dissemination of ideas and the creation of art.

# DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS REPORT

Centre[3] has continued to mature and develop as an organization. Our staff has grown considerably over the last year as we take on more projects and we have made adjustments to accommodate that growth. We remain committed to creating an environment for staff and members that is inclusive, safe, and accessible. Throughout the last year we hosted an accessibility workshop with McMaster,"Defying Barriers," and completed an accessibility audit. An accessibility committee was formed to follow up on the recommendations from the audit. We invested in a superior security system and developed a Safe Space and Harassment Policy that was recently approved by the board. We will continue to work with staff. members, and the board to create a space that respects and protects everyone.

# PROGRAMMING REPORT

Dear Members.

Dear Members,

Centre[3] has had another wonderful year of programming! Our gallery spaces were home to unique exhibitions, opening receptions, artist talks, and performances. Once again, Centre[3] balanced presentations of work that are socially engaged and reflect diversity in contemporary visual culture by presenting regional, national, and international artists. Some highlights from 2018/2019 include:

As part of our residency exchange program with Martha Street Studio in Winnipeg, Manitoba, artist Bram Keast (Winnipeg) delivered an engaging artist talk on his practice during the April Art Crawl on April 12. For the opening reception of our annual curated members' show You Shine, I Shine, We All Shine (July 4 - August 10), guest curated by Ariel Bader-Shamai and Sahra Soudi, artists Charlie Star (Hamilton) and Shanika Maria (Hamilton) delivered a dynamic live performance to a packed gallery during the July Art Crawl on July 12.

With support from SACHA (Sexual Assault Centre Hamilton and Area), the Government of Ontario, and Ontario Arts Council, Centre[3] presented Art[4]Change: Engaging with Things of Great Complexity (September 4 – October 27), curated by Sally Frater and featuring work by Shelly Bahl (New York), Lyncia Begay (Arizona), Tia Cavanagh (Peterborough), Andrea Chung

(California), and Sonali Menezes (Hamilton). The exhibition was positioned as a response to sexual violence and its pervasiveness. The show focused on some of the ways in which rape culture functions within racialized communities, the title referencing the challenges inherent in confronting the enormity of societal entrenchment within gendered violence and the oppression of women.

With support from Canada Council for the Arts, Centre[3] presented Dis[re]placement (November 3 - December 31), a city-wide roadside art exhibition that addressed displacement, gentrification, and environmental impact, and how they relate to homelessness. The project featured work by artists: Hiba Abdallah (Toronto), Roy Caussy (Medicine Hat), Gentrification Tax Action (Toronto), Jesse Harris (Toronto), Alex Jacobs-Blum (Hamilton), Jesse Purcell (Toronto), jes sachse (Toronto), Stylo Starr (Hamilton), and Fwee Twade (Hamilton). This project resulted in outdoor road signs and banners, on both public and private property, in Hamilton's downtown core.

We would like to thank all of the artists who participated in programming this year, as well as our dedicated staff for their passion and expertise in helping to make Centre[3] a centre for critical dissemination of ideas and creation of contemporary art.

The Shift Program is a three-year, provincial-wide grant funded by the Ontario Trillium Foundation to enhance the economic well-being of youth. This innovative multi-week program is specifically designed to use media, visual, and performance art as a vehicle for soft-skill development. Soft-skills are invaluable in assisting youth to attain and maintain employment. The soft-skills developed in the program will include assertive communication, conflict resolution, self-reflection, empathy, adaptability, team building, interpersonal skills, social perceptiveness, time management, leadership, critical thinking, innovation, and initiative. Soft-skill development occurs as participants work in teams using all three art forms to complete a short film-making project while receiving real time feedback from their Shift facilitators who consistently make connections between the skills learned in the project and application of those skills in the real world.

Over a period of three years, the Shift program will collaborate with four employment agencies across Ontario that offer job training and placement for youth in their communities. These include Brantford's Career Link, Kitchener's The Working Centre, Peterborough, and Haliburton's Flemming Crew. The Shift program will design and deliver tailored arts-based activities for soft-skill development and will work with these collaborators to hire and train facilitators in their region. Each organization works closely with the program coordinator to provide feedback on the programs expansion. Additionally, the Shift program will deliver tailored arts-based activities for soft-skill development to youth in nine employment programs in Hamilton, reaching a total of 675 youth.

Art transcends language and linear thinking. It increases engagement and complements traditional forms of learning. Experiential learning sticks, ensuring that the youth will take the skills with them into their new job and realize future success in the workplace.



The Exchange is a storytelling and textile-focused program, with the goal to promote intergenerational sharing and exchange of ideas and skills. This project has specifically been working with members of Indigenous and Newcomer communities within Hamilton. We are currently programming one more workshop series in the new year in collaboration with SACHA.



# **SITELINES**

Sitelines: Art That Works is a new iteration of the project formerly known as Sitelines, which offered free art-based workshops adults with lived to experience of mental health and addiction, in partnership with the Mental Health Rights Coalition. Art That Works similar vein, in а offering professional development workshops to assist in creative entrepreneurship. We have been offering workshops since October in topics such as marketing your art visually, business card and logo creation, writing an artist biography, and more! A goal of this new program is to put together a makers market and exhibition event in May for Mental Health Awareness Month, giving participants a practical hands-on opportunity to sell or exhibit their artwork.



NuSteel has a new teacher this semester named Brian Reich, who is dedicated and experienced in alternative education, coming from programming at King William and Westmount. His background is experiential learning and exploring relationships with the environment, which he is keen to integrate with arts curriculum. NuSteel credits this past year have included: visual art, english, history, creative writing, environmental design, and a leadership course for senior students. There is an eco-friendly approach to many of the projects, mainly through the use of recycled materials. We are also planning to be out and about on field trips as much as possible. Eventually, we will be re-designing the backyard space at Centre[3], therefore we will be visiting spaces of interest throughout the city to help develop an understanding of design possibilities. Projects so far this semester include: repurposed leather covered notebooks, supercrawl postcards, a class quilt made up of symbolic student images, and holiday cards for sale at the December makers market. Trips and speakers include: McMaster art studios and gallery, Workers Arts and Heritage Centre, Whitehern, AGH, Mcmaster climbing wall, and The Cotton Factory at 270 Sherman.






It is through these exciting endeavors in artistic practice that we continue to push the fold on the boundaries of art, so we can continuously witness our community at C[3] grow and prosper!
